Been Locked Up? Don't Be Locked Out

Use Your Voice—VOTE!!

In Illinois, you automatically get back your right to vote after you are released from prison or jail (and people detained pre-trial in jail may be eligible too).* You just need to register and vote like any other citizen.

How Do I Register to Vote?

Illinois residents may register online or by mail (online registration and mail-in forms available at <u>www.elections.il.gov</u> under "Voter Services"). Registration is also available in person at county clerks' offices, board of election commissioners' offices, city and village offices, township offices, schools, public libraries, military recruitment offices, and other locations specifically designated by the election authority.

When Can I Register to Vote?

Regular registration is open year-round except during the 27-day period just prior to an election, and during the 2-day period after each election (one day in Chicago). However, you can still register and vote in person during the 27-day period through grace period registration, available in person at authorized sites.

How Can I Vote?

Voting methods include voting in person and voting by mail. Early voting (with evening and weekend hours available) is also an option, as is grace period registration and voting starting after regular registration deadlines have passed all the way up to and including election day.
